PEDIATRIC MEDI-CAL PROGRAMS

CALIFORNIA CHILDREN'S SERVICES (CCS)

The California Children's Services (CCS) is a state program for children with certain diseases or health problems. It provides diagnostic and treatment services, medical case management, and physical and occupational therapy services to children under age 21 with CCS-eligible medical conditions. Services provided under the CCS program are reimbursed through the CCS program.

COMPREHENSIVE PERINATAL SERVICES PROGRAM (CPSP)

Comprehensive Perinatal Services Program (CPSP) is a state funded program run by the California Department of Public Health, that seeks to improve the health of low-income pregnant women and to give their babies a healthy start in life by providing enhanced Medi-Cal reimbursements to CPSPcertified obstetrical providers who implement CPSP protocols in their practices. CPSP provides obstetric, psychosocial, nutrition, and health education services, and related case coordination to all Medi-Cal pregnant women from conception through 60 days post-partum.

All providers must utilize CPSP tools, including a comprehensive risk assessment tool that is comparable to ACOG and CPSP Standards to document Prenatal and Postpartum Care.

CHILD HEALTH AND DISABILITY PREVENTION PROGRAM (CHDP)

Child Health and Disability Prevention Program (CHDP) is a preventive program that delivers periodic health assessments to low-income children and youth in California. CHDP provides care coordination to assist families with medical appointment scheduling, transportation, and access to diagnostic and treatment services. Health assessments are provided by enrolled private physicians, local health departments, community clinics, managed care plans, and some local school districts via school nurses.

The CHDP age-appropriate assessment should be conducted at the time of the initial health assessment. The initial assessment must include, or arrange for provision of, all immunizations necessary to ensure that the child is up to date for age. Refusal of CHDP services is documented in patient's medical record.

Coverage is free to Medi-Cal recipients from 0–20 years of age. If a medical problem is discovered, Medi-Cal will pay for treatment. Patients may also qualify for the CHDP program if they have a low-to-moderate income and are 1–18 years of age.
